The Saint of the month

Saint Monica Widow (332-388)

A aint Monica, the mother of Saint Augustine, was born in 332 of a Christian family of the ancient city of Tagasta in northern Africa. After a girlhood of singular innocence and piety, she was given in marriage to Patricius, a pagan. She at once devoted herself to his conversion. praying for him always and winning his reverence and love by the holiness of her life and her affectionate patience. She was rewarded by seeing him baptised a year before his death.

When her son Augustine went astray in faith and habits. her prayers and tears were incessant. She once begged a learned bishop that he would talk to her son, in order to bring him to a better frame of mind, but he declined, despairing of success with a young man at once so gifted and so headstrong. At the sight of her prayers and tears, he nonetheless bade her be of good courage, for it could not happen that the child of those tears should perish.

Augustine, by going to Italy,



was able for a time to free himself from his mother's cares but he could not escape from her prayers, which encompassed him like the providence of God. She followed him to Italy: and there. bv his marvellous conversion, her sorrow was turned into joy.

At Ostia, shortly before they were to re-embark for Africa, Augustine and his mother sat at a window conversing on the life of the blessed. She turned to him and said, My son, there is nothing now I care for in this life. What I shall now do, or why I remain on this earth, I know not. The one reason I had for wishing to linger in this life a little longer was that might see you a Catholic Christian before I died. This grace God has granted me superabundantly, seeing you reject earthly happiness to become His servant. A few days afterwards she had an attack of fever and died at the age of fifty-six, in the year 388.

EUCHARISTIC DEVOTION

Let us Love the Most Blessed Sacrament (2)

f we do not all of us go that far, we can at least love Our Lord passionately, and allow ourselves to be dominated by His love.

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Well, transfer this love to Our Lord.

There are not two loves; there is only one.

Our Lord does not ask you to have two hearts, one for Him and one for those you love here below. Mothers, love our Eucharistic Lord with a mother's love. Love Him as your son. Wives, love Him as your husband. Children, love Him as your father.

There is only one faculty of love in us, although it is drawn toward diverse objects for diverse reasons. There are certain people who love madly their parents or friends but do not know how to love God. But what we do for a creature is what we must do for God; with the difference, however, that we must love the Good God beyond all measure, and love Him always more and more.

A soul that loves in that manner has only one power, one life: Our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament. He is there!... The soul lives under the influence of that thought. He is there!... And there results an exchange of love, a fellowship of life. Ah! Why do we not actualise our love? We go back more than nineteen centuries to seek for examples of virtue in the mortal life of Our Lord. But Our Lord could say to us: "You have loved Me on Calvary because there I washed away your sing. You have loved Me in the Crib

your sins. You have loved Me in the Crib because there I was meek and lovable. Why then do you not love Me in the Blessed Sacrament where I am always with you? You have only to come. I am there, alongside of you."

Ah! Our sins are not so much what we should fear being reproached with at the Last Judgment: they are pardoned forever. But Our







Lord will reproach us our little love for Him.

"You loved Me less than creatures. You did not seek the happiness of your life in Me. You loved Me enough not to offend Me mortally, but not enough to live of Me! "

But we may say: "Are we then obliged to love to that extent?"

I am fully aware that there is no written precept to love that much; there is no need for one. Nothing commands it, but everything proclaims it; that law of love is written in our hearts.

Yes, what frightens me is the fact that Catholics will gladly and seriously think of all other mysteries and be devoted to some Saint; but they will do nothing for Our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

But why this state of things? Because we cannot consider the Most Blessed Sacrament attentively without concluding: "I must love Him, and come to visit Him. I must not leave Him alone; He loves me too much!"

In the case of other mysteries, everything is far away; it is past history and does not so easily get a hold on the heart; we do little besides admiring them. But with the Eucharist, we must give ourselves; we must abide and live in Our Lord!

The Eucharist is the noblest aspiration of our heart. Let us therefore love it passionately! Some say: "But all this is exaggeration!"

Love is nothing but exaggeration; to exaggerate is to go beyond the strict requirements of the law.

Love must exaggerate.

Is not the love Our Lord shows us by remaining with us without honour and without servants an exaggerated love?

He does not love who intends limiting himself to his strict duties We love only when we feel the passion of love within us.

If you love the Eucharist passionately, you will habitually have our sacramental Lord in mind; you will find your happiness at His feet; and you will be constantly seeking His good pleasure.

Come! Let us be all taken up with Our Lord! Let us love Him a little for His own sake. Let us forget ourselves and give ourselves to this good Saviour! Let us sacrifice ourselves a bit! Look at the candles and the sanctuary lamp, which burn without leaving any trace, without reserving anything for themselves.

Why should we not be for Our Lord's sake a holocaust of which nothing would be left?

No! Let us live our own life no longer; let Jesus Hostia alone live in us! He loves us so much!

The Prophet Isaiah (Part II)




study of the prophesies of Isaiah in the light of the Gospels reveals a remarkable and accurate fulfilment in many cases to the letter. Our Lord Jesus often reminded His listeners that he had come to fulfil what the inspired words of the prophets had said about Him. This table will look very studious but it is an important argument to prove that He is the Messiah announced by the Prophets.




THE VIRTUE OF PATIENCE

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EXAMPLES OF PATIENCE The Patience of the Saints

To the grace of patience all the saints in great measure owe their eternal reward. Their crown in Heaven will not be due so much to what they have done for God as to what they have suffered for Him. In them 'patience has its perfect work (James 1:4), and that work has been to prepare them for the eternal joys of Heaven. Oh, how grateful they will be to God for the patience that he has given them to suffer willingly for Him! How grateful they will be for the sufferings that have procured for them such happiness inexpressible and peace that knows no end.



The saints while still on earth have a truer view of all the events of life than we have. They value above all things, even while they are still suffering them, the crosses and afflictions that God sends them. The Apostles counted it joy to suffer shame for Christ's sake. 'We glory in tribulation, says Saint Paul. Saint Francis Xavier prayed for more suffering; Saint Teresa that she might go on suffering until her death. This was no mere sentiment, it was common sense and ordinary prudence. They found a real

joy even here in suffering. Have I any such joy? or do I dislike and try to avoid suffering? Here is a test of whether I am like the saints.

The patience of the saints was more severely tried than is ours. Not only were they stoned, racked, torn asunder, not only did they suffer want, distress, afflictions (Hebrews 11:37), but they had to endure what was still harder, ingratitude, failure, unkindness, false accusations, desolation, darkness. Yet they willingly endured all for Jesus' sake, never ceasing to love Him through it all. I have my trials, yet none so dreadful as those, yet I complain even under my lighter cross.



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HOLY SOULS CORNER

The souls in Purgatory receive great consolation from the Blessed Virgin. In the Revelations of Saint Bridget, the Queen of Heaven gives Herself the beautiful name of Mother of the Souls in Purgatory. "I am," she said to that saint, "the Mother of all those who are in the place of expiation; my prayers mitigate the chastisement which are inflicted upon them for their faults."

Mary, Mother of Mercy

On 25th October 1604, in the College of the Society of Jesus at Coimbra, Father Jerome Carvalho died in the odour of sanctity, at the age of fifty years. This admirable and humble servant of God felt a lively apprehension of the sufferings of Purgatory. Neither the cruel macerations which he inflicted upon himself several times every day, not counting those prompted each week by the remembrance of the Passion, nor the six hours which he devoted morning and evening to the meditation of holy subjects, seemed sufficient, in his estimation, to shield him from the chastisement which he imagined awaited him after death. But one day the Queen of Heaven, to whom he had a tender devotion, condescended Herself to console Her servant by the simple assurance that She was a Mother of Mercy to Her dear children in Purgatory as well as to those upon earth. Seeking, later, to spread this consoling doctrine, the holy man accidentally let fall, in the ardour of his discourse, these words; "She told me this Herself."

It is related that a great servant of Mary, Blessed Renier of Citeaux, trembled at the thought of his sins and the terrible Justice of God after death. In his fear, addressing himself to his great Protectress, who calls Herself Mother of Mercy he was rapt in spirit, and saw the Mother of God supplicating Her Son in his favour. "My Son," She said, "deal mercifully with this man in Purgatory, because he humbly repents of his sins." "My Mother," replied Jesus, "I place his cause in Your hands," which meant to say, be it done to your client according to your desire. Blessed Renier understood with unutterable joy that Mary had obtained his exemption from Purgatory.

It is especially on certain days that the Queen of Heaven exercises Her mercy in Purgatory. These privileged days are, first all Saturdays, then the different feast days of the Blessed Virgin, which thus become as festivals in Purgatory. We see in the revelations of the saints that on Saturday, the day specially consecrated to the Blessed Virgin, the sweet Mother of Mercy descends into the dungeons of Purgatory to visit and console Her devout servants. Then, according to the pious belief of the faithful, She delivers those souls who, having worn this holy scapular, enjoy the Sabbatine privilege, and afterwards gives relief and consolation to other souls who had been particularly devoted to Her. A witness to this was the Venerable Sister Paula of Saint Teresa, a Dominican Religious of the Convent of Saint Catherine in Naples. Being rapt in ecstasy one Saturday, and transported in spirit into Purgatory, she was quite surprised to find it transformed into a Paradise of delights, illuminated by a bright light, instead of the usual darkness. While wondering at the change, she perceived the Queen of Heaven surrounded by a multitude of angels, to whom She gave orders to liberate those souls who had honoured Her in a special manner, and conduct them to Heaven.





Chapter 76. Death

Respect for the dead requires that cemeteries be properly kept. We should remember that the bodies of the buried will one day rise again to join immortal souls and live forever with God. Respect for the dead would also advise give up the recent fad of dolling up corpses, painting their faces to make them seem alive, as if they were prepared for some flighty show.

How should we prepare for death? We should prepare for death by leading a good life, avoiding sin, and doing good.

1. We must keep in God's grace and love, so that when the Angel of Death comes, we may *welcome him* as one who takes us home to see the face of our loving Father. The good do not fear death.

Let us die with joy, saying to God, as Holy Simeon did: "Now thou dost dismiss thy servant, O Lord, according to thy word, in peace" (Luke 2:29). Let us imitate Saint Paul, who says, "I have fought the good fight. I have finished the course, I have kept the faith. For the rest, there is laid up for me a crown of justice, which the Lord, the just Judge, will give to me in that day" (2 Timothy 4:7-8).

Saint Augustine exclaims: "O how sweet it is to die, if one's life has been a good one!" For such as he, "to die is gain". To the just man death is only a passing into a better life. It is a journey to his everlasting home, where his heavenly Father dwells. Death is to be feared only by the sinner, for it is the end of his earthly pleasures, and the beginning of his eternal punishment.

2. As a man lives, so he dies. Holy Scripture says: "As the tree falls, so shall it lie" (Ecclesiasticus 11:3). We should often recall the thought of death and eternity so that we may avoid sin. "In all thy works remember thy last end, and thou shalt never sin" (Ecclesiasticus 7:40). Those who put off reforming their lives in the hope of a death-bed repentance are like a traveler who starts packing when the train whistles for departure.

Let us picture the death of a just man, one who all his life has done good and avoided evil. He has often seen people taken away suddenly, when they least expected it, and made up his mind to be always ready to die and face his Judge. He has hoped he would, at the end of his life, die with the Last Sacraments, a priest, and his family by his side. But his obligations have taken him into the wilderness; there he is dying, with only the guide at his side. But he is at peace, and a smile is on his lips, for he is ready to die: being always in the state of grace, he is ready to meet his Judge anywhere, any time. He knows the Judge will smile, too, and welcome him as a good son, a friend.



3. We should also have our *temporal affairs* in order when we die. This is why adults should make a *will* in order that no confusion may arise over their property after their death. A sudden death is not to be desired, for then we may not be able to put in order our spiritual and temporal affairs.

This is why in the Litanies we pray: "From a sudden and unprovided death, deliver us, O Lord!"
